They stripped down to bassist/vocalist Dean Irving, guitarist/vocalist Dan Harding and Rod Anderson sitting on and slapping a box drum. All three of them sang harmonies.

The cornerstone of their set was an impressive medley of at least 20 songs based on Sublime's 1997 hit "What I Got," which included lines from every '90s hit I could remember and I few I hoped I could forget.

They covered everything from hard rock to bubblegum pop from Eminem to Bon Jovi and threw in some Spice Girls, random rap tracks and the theme song from "Fresh Prince of Bel Air" as Harding imitated DJ record scratching by scratching his guitar strings.

Just to show their influences, they threw in a few bars of the Who's Baba O'Riley. And nobody missed a beat or a note.
